Record Crowds Arrive for Mexican Independence Festival

It was shoulder to shoulder at the Cicero Fairgrounds for Mexican Independence Day as more than 30,000 people filed into the festival during each day of the four-day celebration. What has become the largest festival in the region, Mexican Independence Day's celebration ended with Sunday's parade down to the fairgrounds and El Grito at the end of the evening.

The four-day event featured live music, food, carnival rides, games and giveaways. Town President Larry Dominick rode on a renovated fire truck in the parade. He said he was delighted that community residents enjoyed the festival.

"We had a new ride this year, no Cadillac convertible. We had a fire truck that's not in service anymore. It's 20 years old, and our mechanic, Danny Wolf and his guys, fixed it up like brand new. We had a good time up there. It's a lot better view," Dominick said. "I want to thank everyone in our Special Events Department for organizing this so well."

After the parade, Dominick and his wife Diana, Cicero's Senior Center Director, handed out bracelets throughout the afternoon. More than 4,000 children enjoyed free carnival rides thanks to the Dominicks' generosity.

"Everybody's independence is important, and since we have a huge Spanish population, I want to show them that I'm part of them and that we celebrate. I wish them all a good time when they come here. As you can see, the festival is over-packed. We had a great parade. I'm proud I could do it. I see many smiling kids' faces, and I like that," Dominick said.

The Consulate General of Mexico in Chicago joined the Cicero Mexican Cultural Committee on the main stage for the annual El Grito, with Deputy Council General Gerardo Guerrero giving the official cry of Dolores that signaled the start of the Mexican Revolution.

"There is no place like Cicero. We are very excited to be here. This is actually the largest El Grito that we have seen so far," said Claudia Castillo, Community Affairs member for the Consulate General.

All of the town's officials participated in the festival

celebrating Mexican American heritage, including Supervisor Joe Virruso, Clerk Maria Punzo-Arias, Assessor Emilio "Emo" Cundari, Collector Fran Reitz, and trustees Bob Porod, Victor Garcia, John Cava and Blanca Vargas.

"We do this every year, and we want to make sure that we keep up the tradition of all the heritage in the town. In Cicero, we do it all," Cundari said before yelling to the crowd, "Bienvenidos a Cicero!"

Cook County Commissioner Frank Aguilar said Dominick has always supported the Cicero Mexican Cultural Committee.

"President Larry Dominick has been very supportive since the beginning, in 2006, when we founded the Cicero Mexican Cultural Committee," Aguilar said. "There has been a lot of celebrations throughout the Midwest, but this is the biggest in the Midwest. Cicero made an international impact. We're glad to be here; it's a wonderful event. Let's celebrate as respectfully, responsibly, and as safely as we can."

Town Trustee Blanca Vargas shared her joy at the celebration, crediting the town president for the festival's success.

"I am very proud to participate in a function we have done for many years. These are the roots of our independence of Mexico. We have been celebrating with pride and with discipline to make sure that our community is happy," Vargas said. "I am very proud to be Mexican. President Larry Dominick wishes everyone to be happy. Viva Mexico Que Viva!"

Cicero Firefighters Receive Commendations

Cicero fire trucks lined up outside town hall before the September 12 board meeting as town and fire officials presented commendations to eight firefighters and paramedics.

"Saving lives is not a cliché around here; it actually happens more than most people are aware of," said Fire Chief Jeff Penzkofer. "Just so everyone is aware, this is the shift that worked the flood. They were the ones who worked that whole day."

During the commendation, Penzkofer explained his department saves lives every day and that this is their job.

"On this particular day, two lives were saved on two separate insistences. Normally, we wouldn't be here right now, but after it had happened, one of the paramedics came into my office and wanted to let me know that the fireman that helped out the paramedic, for manpower reasons obviously on these calls, he wanted to acknowledge it. One thing led to another, and we said, why don't we remind everybody what these guys do."

As a result, Lt. Kenneth Pereyra, Engineer Michael Stahl, Engineer Edward Ross, firefighters Steve Krygsheld

and Jonathan Marcolini, and firefighter-paramedics Christopher Vaval, Adam Lavery and Bryeur Purdy received commendations and standing ovations at the board meeting.

"The significance of this was it happened back-to-back with not that much downtime; it was the same crews," said Cicero Fire Department Assistant Chief Steve Schwar.

Library Hosts International Journalist

The Cicero Public Library invited Dr. Catalina Maria Johnson for a special presentation on Latino influence on music in the United States on September 9. Her presentation brought music lovers of all ages as part of the continued programming the library has done to bring residents together.

Dr. Johnson delivered in English and Spanish to accommodate all the community residents present.

"I'm grateful to see those who came, from all ages, to learn more about music and its influence in our lives and how it can connect us," said Sandra Tomschin, Director of the Cicero Public Library.

"There's never been one human society without music," Johnson said. "It's part of every human activity...Music tells our story."

She said that many of Los Tigres del Norte's works have valuable history lessons. Son Jarocho and Mariachi are also essential to tell the Latino story.

"La Bamba' by Ritchie Valens comes from Son Jarocho, and it's one of the most famous rock and roll tunes."

Near the conclusion of her remarks, Johnson brought up Voyager's Golden Record. The satellites, both which have left the solar system, contains sayings, sounds and music from Earth. One song is "El Cascabel" or "The Bell" by Lorenzo Barcelata, which is a Mariachi tune. Antonio Maciel and Los Aguilillas perform the song with Mariachi Mexico de Pepe Villa, conducted by Rafael Carrion.

The fun continued after Dr. Johnsons' presentation with a Morton East High School Mariachi Los Jinetes concert at the Library Garden.






